Greetings from the Fire Department,

Well it's safe to say that winter has made its appearance. We would like to remind everyone to have a Happy and Safe season with some reminders. Check your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. The batteries should be changed every spring and fall with the time change and the unit replaced every 8-10 years, or sooner if manufacturer recommends. Remember our houses are closed tight this time of year and carbon monoxide is colorless and odorless, is cumulative in its effect and concentrates in your blood depriving your body of oxygen. Carbon monoxide poisoning usually presents as headache and flu like symptoms.

Be mindful of your holiday decorations. Keep your tree watered if you use a real tree. Check your lights and discard any frayed or dangerous lights. Keep candles and other fire hazards under your observation. A real tree can become fully engulfed and ignite a structure fire within minutes.

Snow accumulation can block exhaust vents causing Carbon Monoxide to build in a structure. Check your furnace and your dryer vents often and after every snowfall. We would also request that when you clear snow on your property to be certain to keep your fire sign visible so crews can find your house easily when seconds might count. Should your fire sign become damaged or unreadable, please contact us immediately so we can replace it.

We have been busy working on our ISO rating; This is an insurance rating which can result in savings for homeowners. They look at all records, training, education, policy, procedure, how well we work with our neighboring communities, equipment and our ability to effectively extinguish fire. As you can imagine this is a huge undertaking.

We have moved into our new living area and would like to thank everyone for their support. It would not have been possible without our wonderful residents.

We have been working on funding via fundraisers and grants to purchase new cardiac monitor/ defibrillators for our ambulances. Our goal is \$70,000 for 2 units. Our current ones are excellent but are aging and technology has changed considerably.

We have started the planning stages of replacing our frontline engine 1502. We have had this for many years of service. We will update as we have more details.

From the Supervisor's Desk

At our November meeting, the township board voted to freeze the amount of property taxes paid to both the township and road district for 2019.

me to get information out to you quickly!

You probably know that over 95% of township funds come from property taxes. But these annual township and road district taxes represents only about 8.7% of property tax bills throughout Big Rock.

The township and road district have sufficient funds to continue to maintain our current programs and services without a tax increase next year. Planned spending includes staff and elected officials salaries; assuring availability of mental health and substance abuse services; general and emergency assistance; maintaining the town hall; maintaining, plowing and salting all roads (including the Village); inspection and general maintenance of township bridges; mowing ditches and roadsides; and other community needs.

We know a freeze on the township portion may not be noticed within your total tax bill. But it is good to know that your township officials will continue to keep the township property taxes low while maintaining services and funding the improvements that keep our community as a great place to live.

Winter is definitely early with two early November snow storms causing problems from downed power lines, falling trees, broken road signs, and minor flooding. If you have any problem with downed trees or blocked drainage ditches, please call the road district office directly at 630-556-4331. While we make every effort to be careful, mailboxes damaged from the force of snow being plowed to the side will be replaced. All messages are responded to as quickly as possible.

Plowing may begin overnight or very early morning to have roads open for the morning commute. Wet snow can weigh 20 pounds per sq. ft, so our trucks need to maintain an appropriate speed when plowing in order to push the heavy snow to the sides. Until the ground is completely frozen, we cannot plow all the way to edge of road.

No parking on any township road if snow of 2 inches or more is forecast. We appreciate your help with this, and thanks to those of you who put orange markers at the edge of the road to help us know where yard starts!

STEP (SEPTIC TANK EFFLUENT PUMP) SYSTEM MAINTENANCE

Please know that the village has a contractor that will be performing regular (annual) maintenance/pumping of the village tanks on private property. These tanks are identified by the "green" riser lids that are located in resident(s) yards. Contractor's will be identified by wearing village labeled lanyards and/or bright yellow safety vests. Should you have any questions or concerns please call the village office and we will assist in verification of work being performed on septic tank located on your property.

SNOW PLOWING

With the winter/snow season upon us the village would like to remind residents of its parking ban on all village streets when snow accumulations exceed 2 inches. Our Big Rock highway department need the roadways clear of parked vehicles so they can do their job to keep the streets clean. The villages zoning enforcement/property maintenance officer will issue citations for cars that are in violation of the ordinance. First offense is a \$25 fine and the second offense will result in the vehicle being towed at the owners expense. The village has had a parking ban ordinance in effect for many years. Please do your part to assist in keeping our village streets, alleys, and roads clear so they can be maintained properly.

VILLAGE POLICING

The Village has heard and witnessed firsthand for many years traffic that comes through our small town driving at speeds well above our posted speed limits. As a result it's been discussed on numerous occasions ways the village can reduce those disobeying our traffic speed limits. The village board has been budgeting accordingly and has recently been in discussions and signed a contract with Kane County to pay for a deputy to specifically cover Big Rock. The officer will randomly be patrolling within Big Rock during high traffic times paying special attention to violators on Rte 30, Rhodes Rd, and Granart Rd. The village hopes that with more police presence/enforcement that this will slow people down and make our community roads safer to be on.

LOCATING SERVICES (CALL811)

Please be advised that the village has been billed for many "double & triple locates" when digging on property has occurred. If you are building on your property and have obtained the necessary village/county approvals to do so, please communicate with your contractor on whom is doing any locating on your property. In addition when the locate has been completed and the mini flags are present please don't remove them until the job no longer requires these visible markers. This will help keep costs in line and hopefully eliminate multiple locates for the same property.

Please visit us during office hours or stop by for an upcoming meeting. They are very informative and productive evening meetings starting at 7 p.m. on the second and fourth Tuesday of every month. Agendas are always posted in advance at the Park District & Post Office if you're curious as to what's going to be covered. FRIENDS OF THE COMMUNITY

Jack Hake and his wife Dorothy have four children, 12 grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren and have lived in Big Rock since 1964. Jack started Hake Realty in 1962 and was in business for 41 years, Hake Income Tax was started in 1963 and he retired in 2013, after 50 years.

In 1964, Jack became interested in the Plowing Match. He recalls helping Larry Thomas that first year by making him a hitch and guide on an old Farmall that Larry had borrowed. Being very handy with his welding machine and cutting, he has fixed the mowers and decks used to cut the grass at the Plowing Match grounds, put a wide front end on his own H Farmall and loaned it to Jim Cronin for his first time ever plowing. He also helped Eric Hatfield and his Grandpa the first time Eric every plowed and assisted many by cutting or welding equipment for them. He also helped build a place for the 4-H members to tie up their cattle at the Plowing Match that is still in use today. Jack has loaned his tractor and drag to groom Kenny Field and many times used his truck to go after something at the last minute.

Over the years Hake Realty has given many trophies for the Grand Champion Angus at the 4-H show at the Plowing Match and has made other contributions that are too numerous to mention. Jack is always eager to use his 1912 Moon Brothers horse

drawn buggy. The buggy was used to transport Grand Marshall Albert Lash as he rode in the parade commemorating the 100th Big Rock Plowing Match. Jack also recalls a good many years ago, sitting night watch during the Plowing Match with the late Ike Grover.

Jack made the wooden "Man and Team of Horses Plowing" and with the help of his son - Ed, Roger Hatfield, Marv Ray and Bill Brickert mounted it on the main building's roof at the Plowing Match. Jack had always thought there should be a plow erected on the Plowing Match grounds and in 1994, he started making a left hand plow - he tried to find one after searching all of his contacts over a six state area. Not finding one, he decided to make the plow since he has never seen a factory-made left hand walking plow. Jack remade another old plow and put them atop of poles so there could be a place to fly the Plowing Match Flag and the State Flag. With the help of Bill Brickert and Roger Hatfield setting the plows in place (of course one plow had to be green and the other red!) the flags have a prominent place on the grounds.

Jack was also on the 100th Year Plowing Match Special Committee. Among those events were the Mid-America Duck Race, the Children's Old-Fashioned Games, the Old-Fashioned Barn Dance, the Parade, The Ice Cream Social, the Fireworks, the Beard-Growing Contest, the Round Bale Roll-Off, the Hospitality Tent, the Big Rock High School Alumni Banquet and the Fireman's Dance. Jack helped with all the events but was in charge of the Beard-Growing Contest and the Old-Fashioned Games.

The Round Bale Roll-Off was started after Jack seen an article in the Farm Show magazine and told his son-in-law, Gene Nehring, about it and decided it would be a good project at the Plowing Match. The event started in a space near Kenny Field and has since moved to the cattle ring where it is still drawing a nice crowd of spectators and many agile participants.

Jack was the chartering President for the Big Rock Historical Society and it became a non-profit organization in 1995. The Big Rock Historical Society was looking for a permanent place to meet and in 1997 Marvel Davis donated a corncrib, along with an additional three acres of land situated across from the Plowing Match grounds on Hinckley Road. The Big Rock Congregational Church had asked the Historical Society if they would like the house built by the Michael family in the early 1900's so they could increase the size of their parking lot. Raising money for the building to be moved included dinner dances and spring auctions. Jack was instrumental in getting a \$60,000 Riverboat Grant from the Kane County Preservation District in early 2001, and the move was finally able to take place. Jack said the historic building will be used as a community "lending" library, which simply means the library won't be funded by a taxing body or appear on any tax roll. Jack and Dorothy also sold name bricks to raise money and the bricks were placed around the flag pole and a path leading to the front door of the crib.

The Big Rock Park Dedication was held on Sunday, July 14, 2002, the Hake Pavilion was dedicated in honor of Jack and Dorothy Hake, who were instrumental in the financial start of the Big Rock Community Park. The Park has a half mile walking path with benches and trees along the way, a basketball/tennis court, sand volleyball, playground equipment, two baseball diamonds with bleachers and back stops, two soccer fields, bathrooms, three grills that are provided to enjoy a picnic under the Hake Pavilion.

Since the tragedy of September 11th, Jack thought Big Rock needed a drop off box for old flags since so many were expressing their feelings by flying flags. Norma Leifheit donated an old mailbox and Jack, a veteran, was inspired to paint and decorate the mail box with stars and stripes. The drop off box is located at the Big Rock Historical Society building just East of the of Plowing Match Grounds. Since the installation, 2,002 flags have been collected to date and given to Scout groups to be burned in a dignified ceremony.

The Big Rock Park District and community thank Jack and Dorothy for their community involvement over the years.
